

Our Impact

In 2023, our caring staff worked with community partners and 174 volunteers to improve the lives of nearly 2,000 seniors.








I think it is wonderful that you offer so many services to seniors. I appreciate the monthly cleaning and rides to appointments. Thank you 100% for keeping me out of a care home.

Participant Perspectives

Last year, we set out to ask participants in our *Better at Home* program for feedback on their daily living after being connected with at-home services. We received surveys from 98 clients, including 86% of respondents who were over 80 years of age. Highlights included:

- 99% felt more secure with remaining independent in their home.
- 96% knew where to go for help if a problem were to occur.
- 81% felt better connected to their community.
- 76% reported less worry in their lives.

The three words that participants most often chose to best describe their home support services: useful, reliable, and good quality.





AT HOME SUPPORT SERVICES

Better at Home- is designed to assist seniors aged 65 and above with managing their day-to-day tasks, ensuring they maintain their independence while staying connected to their communities. Home support encompasses a range of services, including light housekeeping, grocery assistance, light yard work, minor home repairs, transportation, snow removal, and friendly visits. Services are tailored to individual needs, with services offered at no cost by volunteers and sliding-scale rates for contractor services. We collaborate with the Westside Health Network and Lake Country Health Planning to support seniors in Kelowna, West Kelowna, Westbank First Nation, and Lake Country. In 2023, Better at Home enhanced the lives of 592 seniors and engaged 121 volunteers in service delivery.

HEALTH PROMOTION ACTIVITIES

Community Connector- unlocks the potential of social prescribing by connecting seniors to a variety of local programs to improve their health. Physicians and health professionals can refer older patients to our initiative, knowing our Community Connector will then link individuals with local services and activities tailored to enhance their health and well-being. Whether it's nutritional services, social opportunities, physical activity, arts activities, or mental health supports, our social prescriptions foster improved social connections, enhanced mental health, and reduced reliance on emergency medical interventions. In 2023, our Community Connector facilitated the participation of 102 seniors in programs tailored to their needs and interests.



SOCIAL RECREATION PROGRAMS

Seniors Activity Centre- provides a variety of affordable social recreation opportunities in a welcoming environment. The programs are possible thanks to the wisdom and generosity of senior volunteers who host activities. For a nominal membership fee, participants can enjoy social activities organized by our members and small associations that rent space for their activities. Member-run programs include bingo, bridge, mahjong, and dancing. Associations who rent space include the Kelowna Palette Club; Let's Play Bridge Kelowna; Kelowna Calligraphers' Guild; Kelowna Stamp Club; 1120 Rock Club; PROBUS Club of Kelowna-Ogopogo; BC Old Time Fiddlers Association and many others.







HOUSING INFORMATION & NAVIGATION

Seniors Housing Information & Navigation Ease- supports seniors, who are experiencing housing precarity, to secure stable housing that is appropriate and safe. While we do not directly provide housing, our SHINE Housing Navigator offers invaluable support in accessing BC Housing resources, securing SAFER rent subsidies, and reviewing eligibility for government supports. The Housing Navigator also helps clients with their housing search, tenant applications, review of lease terms and home set-up. In 2023, our Housing Navigator responded to 995 inquiries, provided case management support to 73 seniors, and assisted 24 precariously housed seniors in finding stable rental housing

FINANCIAL EMPOWERMENT ACTIVITIES

Community Volunteer Income Tax Program - maximizes the financial well-being of seniors. Our free tax clinic, staffed by trained volunteers, assists older adults with modest incomes and simple tax situations in filing their returns. By accessing benefits like Old Age Security, Guaranteed Income Supplement, and G.S.T. Rebate, we helped 608 seniors boost their monthly income and secure greater financial stability.

Special Projects

HOLIDAY GIVING

Every year, we celebrate the spirit of giving with our Holiday Hampers and Stockings for Seniors. In 2023, we extended heartfelt gifts to 57 seniors facing social isolation and/or financial hardship. None of these seasonal festivities would be possible without the dedication of our volunteers and the support of local benefactors such as London Drugs, CIR Realty, Kelowna Infinity Nissan, TELUS Community Ambassadors, Pushor Mitchell, Rutland Seniors Society, Acres Development, Summerwood Regency, and more.

POSTIES FOR SENIORS

Recognizing the profound impact of a friendly hello and meaningful conversations, especially for those with limited social interaction, some volunteers with the Canadian Union of Postal Workers #760 reached out to us offering to provide seniors with a fun summer barbeque. Despite the unfortunate cancellation of our summer event due to wildfires, the volunteers were determined to remind seniors that people were thinking of them. In August, the Posties embarked on their kind initiative to deliver personalized care packages and foster connections with 40 seniors.







SENIORS CENTRE WITHOUT WALLS

An outreach initiative, known as Seniors Centre Without Walls, served to bridge the gap between older adults and their community through an array of social, educational, and wellness programs offered via phone and virtual platforms. Thanks to project funding from The Canadian Women's Foundation, we were able to provide free workshops and social activities tailored for older women facing barriers to accessing in-person services. The project engaged 86 participants and we are now working towards incorporating virtual programs into the monthly activities of our Seniors Activity Centre.

MORE THAN MEALS

Through collaboration with various community partners, including Meals on Wheels, Westside Salvation Army, BC Association of Farmers' Markets, The Vibrant Veggie Garden, and United Way of British Columbia, our More Than Meals initiative aims to bolster the food security of vulnerable seniors in the Central Okanagan. From providing produce hampers and prepared meals to distributing coupons for our local farmer's market, our food-related activities ensured 99 seniors had access to nutritious food last year.
